Women of the Bible: Tamar & Rahab

Tamar (Daughter-in-law of Judah)

- Judah leaves Tamar to be a childless widow
 - v. 26 "She is more righteous (*right*) than I, since I wouldn't give her to my son Shelah."
- Genesis 38 is a "comparison" chapter
 - Joseph sold into slavery (37) and resist's Potiphar's wife (39)
 - "self-control" of Joseph vs. "indulgence" of Judah
 - God did not hide the "unsatisfactory" details

What can we learn from Tamar's story?

- Tamar demonstrated faithfulness to:
 - Her culture, by marrying Er and Onan
 - Judah, by "honoring" his authority
- Numbers 32:23
 - "...be sure your sin will find you out"
- Romans 5:20
 - "But where sin abounded, grace abounded much more"

Rahab (Great-grandmother of David)

- Joshua 2
 - The Israelites gather intel on the land they are about to conquer
- Spies are sent into Jericho
 - v. 20 "for the LORD your God, He is God in heaven above and on earth beneath" (*Rahab*)
 - Rahab hides the spies on her roof and sends them out opposite of the search party
- Rahab, her family and possessions are spared during the Israelites' attack on the city

What can we learn from Rahab's story?

- Rahab demonstrated faithfulness to:
 - The LORD, by receiving the spies with peace (*Hebrews* 11:31; *James* 2:25)
 - The Israelite spies, by:
 - Not compromising the secret mission
 - Keeping the scarlet cord outside her window
 - Staying inside here house during the raid

What can we learn from BOTH stories?

- God's providence <u>should be</u> one of the most comforting truth revealed to us.
 - Isaiah 14:27 "For the LORD of hosts has purposed, and who will annul it?"
- No condemnation DOES NOT MEAN no consequences
 - Tamar AND Rahab suffered reputation damages
 - Other examples: "doubting Thomas" or "denying Peter"

Titus 2:11-12
